

7 WHO'S IN THE PLAYGROUND?

Investigate what is happening in your playground.

- a Think of a question you would like answered, or test a statement you think is true.

For example:

How many children play on each piece of equipment during morning tea break?

How many children are sitting, walking or running?

What size groups are children playing in?

Boys play on the flying fox more than girls.

- b You could collect data using a tally chart, choice cards, or take photos of students playing in the playground during morning tea break.
- c Collect data that will answer your questions or provide evidence to prove or disprove a statement you are testing.
- d Display your data in an interesting way.
- e Make statements about what your data shows.
- f Compare the results of your survey with others. What do you notice?
- g Is there something else that you would like to find out about your school playground?
- h Who might be interested in this data?
Could it be used to make some changes at your school?

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
